REQUEST FOR DIRECTION

Subject: Water Dr./Mallard St. Right-of-Way Rehabilitation

Recommendation: Recover vehicle access to municipal utilities (water and sewer) and improve access for emergency services within the same dimensions of the existing roadway, roughly 7M or 23ft wide. Approximately 40M or 131ft linear.

* Regardless of outcome, regaining access to our utilities must be done.

PWS Comments: Our ability to access our utilities is hampered by extreme over growth and debris that has been discarded throughout time. Council and staff have identified that all municipal right-of-ways and road ways need to be maintained for immediate access. It has also been noted by the Port Clements Volunteer Fire Department that emergency response for fires could be difficult due to the inaccessibility of hydrants in the area.

Key Issues/Concepts Defined:

Municipal Boundaries/Utilities

Once passable, the intersection of Water Dr. and Mallard St. has been allowed to go back to nature over the years, as well as provide a brush dumping ground for near-by residents. This area is also one of the few beach accesses available within the community. The Village of Port Clements has a water main and main sewer line underneath this intersection. Upon recent assessment, Public Works have found that maturing brush and Alders are growing directly on top of a manhole, making it inaccessible for inspection. A poorly placed hydro pole and fully matured Alder on Water Dr. have made the municipal utilities impossible to access by vehicle. A collection of vehicles, halfway onto Mallard St. has made access to these utilities impossible off of Mallard St. Please see pictures.

Emergency Services

It has been brought to the Village's attention by the Port Clements Volunteer Fire Department that to access approximately 8 homes along Bayview Dr. and Mallard St. would be a run of approximately 220M or 722ft to the nearest hydrant. Please see report from Fire Chief Craig Beachy. If access to the Water Dr. hydrant were made available, this would reduce the distance to approximately 50M or 164ft.

Response Options:

1. Remove all brush, debris and establish a road through from Water Dr. to Mallard St. the same dimensions as the existing road, 7M or 23ft plus ditches, creating a Crescent approximately 40M or 131ft linear, allowing access to the beach via a walkway.
 2. Remove enough brush and debris to establish a walkway or gated fire lane to improve accessibility for emergency services and utilities, approx 5m or 16ft wide and 40M or 131ft linear.
 3. Install fire hydrant in alternate location to better service homes in the area, clean up underbrush between Water Dr. and Mallard for foot access only.

To Port Clements Village council,

Fire hydrant locations are an important factor in fire protection. It is our policy to never go past the fire to get to the fire hydrant. There is quite a long stretch between the hydrant at 35 Bay View and the hydrant at the corner of Bay View and Jasper St. 353 meters (1,162 feet) From the hydrant at 35 Bay View to Mallard Street is 220 meters. If we could access Mallard Street by driving through Water Drive it is only 55 meters from the hydrant on Water Drive to Mallard Street. This would save us 165 meters (543 feet) of hose, which means faster response time and a better water supply for fire protection at the 8 residents between Mallard and Jasper Streets.

Another option if you do not want to open the road between Water Drive and Mallard Street would be to install another fire hydrant at the corner of Bay View and Mallard on the south side of the road.

Thank you for considering this matter.

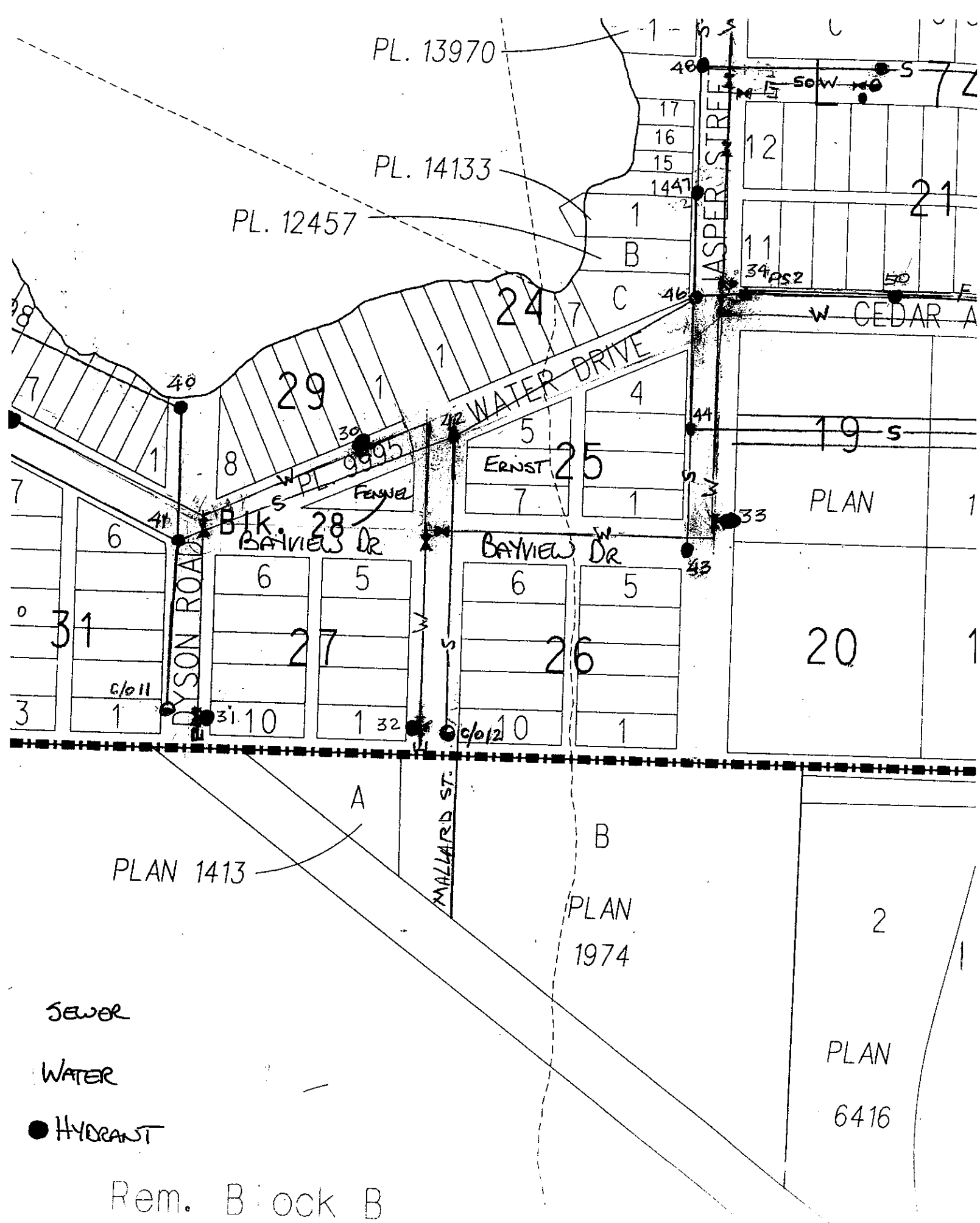

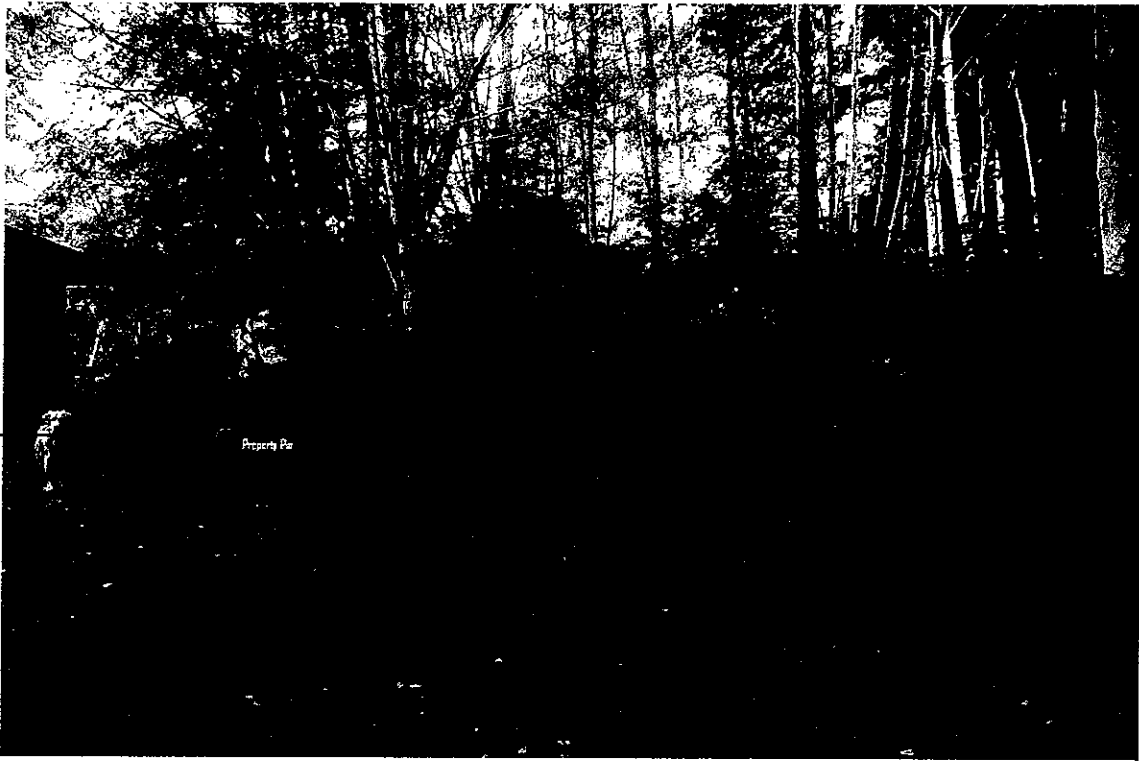

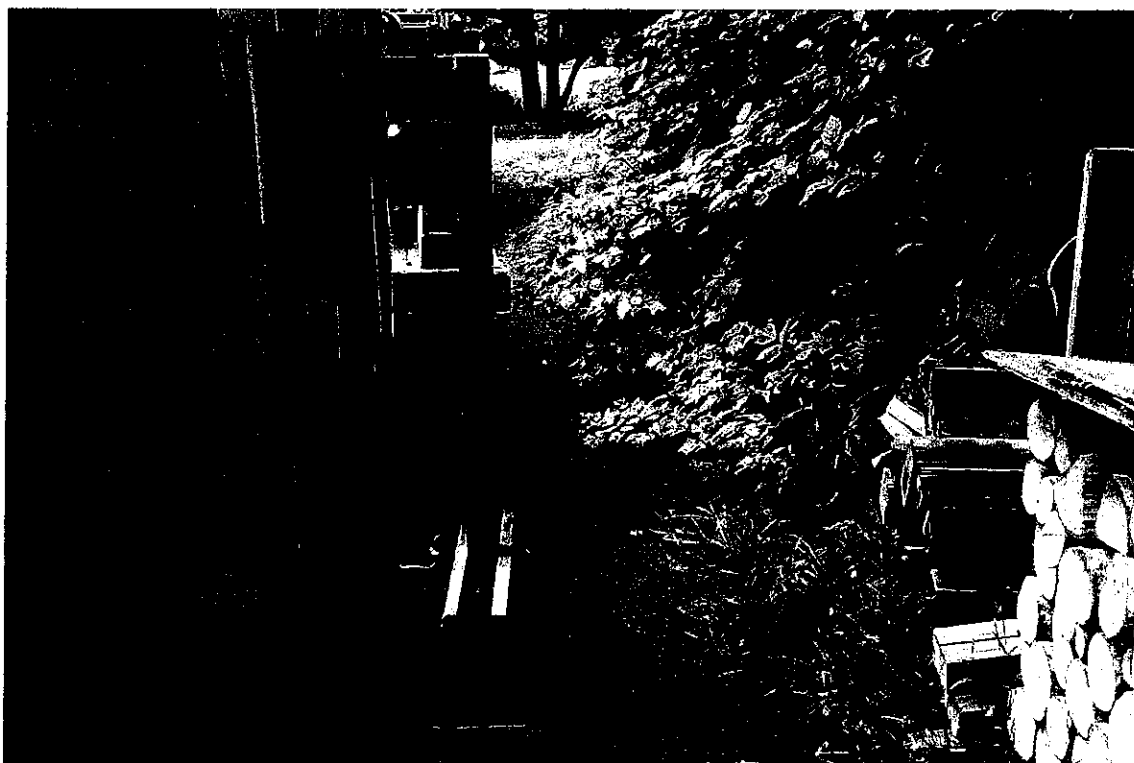

Hikers pack fishing rods, but no food as they start 2-month trek

After 10 months of preparation, two UNBC students are setting off this week to hike from Masset to Queen Charlotte via the west coast of Haida Gwaii.

Sam Harrison of Vancouver and Nathan Leenders of Whitehorse intend to spend the next two months trekking along the remote northern and western shorelines, surviving entirely on food they harvest along the way.

It's all to bring attention to the proposed Enbridge pipeline and the potential for an oil spill to ruin the rich stores of seafood off the coast of Haida Gwaii. Mr. Harrison and Mr. Leenders have a website, tankersnothankers.ca, where they have been sharing information about Enbridge and describing their trip preparations.

The two men have a lot of wilderness and food gathering experience between them. Mr. Harrison has worked at a fish-

"Hopefully we'll find something that will satisfy all parties," she said.

Juskatla post office closes

The postmaster in Juskatla says she's been forced out of her tiny post office.

Gloria Tauber has been working at the Juskatla post office for 35 years, but she recently received notice of termination from her position. The exact reason for the termination is not clear, but she said she's been caught in the middle of the complicated politics between Western Forest Products and the Council of the Haida Nation over the purchase of the islands largest tree farm licence.

Juskatla is a former logging camp and was the site of the Western Forest Products office. According to Canada Post, the small post office has only one customer.

Canada Post spokesperson John Caines said the post office was temporarily closed on June 13 when the power was cut off to the facility. According to him, the postmaster was served notice of eviction and asked to vacate the premise by June 30. Canada Post was able to extend this until July 5. Mr. Caines said the one general delivery customer who received mail at Juskatla was redirected to Port Clements.

Mr. Caines also said the postmaster was told she would need to find another premise to operate out of, but she had not done so. He said she'd been offered another position in Port Clements but she declined. When the Observer asked whether they would reopen the post office if another facility was found, he said they would have to look at what business there was to serve.

Ms Tauber said she offered to move the post office to a trailer she owns in the area and use her own generator to supply power, but was told that does not have wheelchair access and it is unsafe to use a generator. She said two other people are losing part-time contract jobs due to the sudden closure.

Islander publishes double novel

North Beach raconteur Rich Schultz has just published his first book, and it contains not just one but two short novels.

"Breathe or Die" and "Reward for the Safe Return" are both fast-paced adventure stories set on Haida Gwaii.

Mr. Schultz said he wrote the first story in a three-day novel writing contest over Labour Day weekend one year, and had so much fun that he entered the contest again a year later and wrote the second tale.

Mr. Schultz wrote the books right on North Beach, where he has a cabin.

"You just sit down and type like crazy," he said. "You're under pressure and under stress, it's really quite cool."

He didn't win either contest (both attracted more than 500 entries), but he liked his stories so much that he decided to self-publish them. The book's covers were designed by his wife, Lisa Sweanor.

The people who have read the books so far seem to like them, he said.

"I think they have good character development and good plot, especially the second one," he said.

Mr. Schultz said he thinks book two, "Reward for the Safe Return" has potential as a movie, and he's hoping that someone on the islands will adapt and film it. Haida Gwaii has plenty of talent, he said, and it would be great to see a movie made locally.

"What would give me huge joy is if we could make a movie, a professional movie on island, it would be fabulous," he said. "I've been kind of talking it around."

The books are available at the New Moon over Naikoon Bakery on Tow Hill Road, or from Mr. Schultz himself.

Ms Churchill noted that the Haida have cultural and traditional sites in the area that they are interested in continuing to access.

"People in Skidegate have traditionally and historically used the area for food fishing activities," she said.

Although the owner is not proceeding with deactivating the road at this time, that does not mean that people are allowed to use the road.

"Government can't give permission for someone to use private property," said Mr. Munt.

Dear Mrs. Nelson-Smith:

Thank you for your correspondence addressed to the office of Darren Entwistle dated May 24, 2011 requesting improved wireless service in your community and the Highway 16 corridor between Sandspit and Massett. Following your request, a detailed assessment was completed to understand the specific issue with coverage in the areas of your request.

Thank you also for our discussion on June 27 clarifying your view of the benefit our service would bring to your community. TELUS recognizes your concern for coverage and the value it brings for personal and business communications, as well as for reporting emergency situations. When preparing our annual plan investment in new wireless sites, our organization goes through a rigorous review of all our investment decisions to ensure returns and benefits for both the community and for our TELUS shareholders. Local interest in wireless coverage as you have expressed is one of the key factors we consider. Expanding coverage to rural areas involves significant infrastructure and maintenance costs including wireless site construction and operations, electrical connections, and connection by fiber optic cable or microwave back to our TELUS network. Unfortunately, based on the difficulty to provide additional transport bandwidth to Graham Island, and the high cost to provide coverage in Port Clements and along Hwy 16, TELUS is unable to commit to the coverage expansion you are requesting at this time.

Nevertheless, with the increased demand for service, technological advancements that continue to reduce the costs of equipment, and the government's interest in seeing wireless coverage expanded throughout British Columbia, I am optimistic we will be in a position to provide



enhanced wireless coverage for Haida Gwaii in the future. TELUS will identify this area as having the potential for future expansion, and prioritize accordingly as our coverage plan is expanded.

Dear Minister Cadeux & Deputy Minister Henderson:

Since January of 2007 the Village of Port Clements has been requesting cellular phone service which is available to other areas of Haida Gwaii and to date this vital service is still not available.

Your Ministry will have received a copy of the Village's letter of May 24th, 2011 to Mr. Darren Entwistle, President of Telus and to date neither your Ministry nor Telus have responded

In 2008 the Union of British Columbia Municipalities addressed the concerns of remote communities regarding cell phone service and that year Premier Campbell addressed the issue stating: *It would take **three years** but we're going to use all of the purchasing power of our broad public institutions to bridge the last mile for those who live in rural and remote communities so that you're connected with everyone in BC."*

In 2010 the UBCM once again brought this issue forward by resolution and Ministry of Citizens Services responded: *"The Government of British Columbia has committed to leveraging the Province's telecommunications buying power to obtain expanded internet and cellular coverage for citizens in rural and remote areas. A large-scale telecommunications procurement is currently underway and expected to be completed by **Spring 2011.**"*

I'm sure you can appreciate that cell phone service is critical for all areas of the province, not only for the safety of our citizens in emergency situations; but for the travelling public, business owners and residents.

We understand that a motion proposing the elimination of MSP premiums for all seniors in British Columbia will be considered at the UBCM Annual General Meeting in September. BC is the only province in Canada whose seniors pay for their medical insurance. This inequality needs to be addressed and resolved so that BC seniors receive the same benefits as those in other provinces.


The pensions, both federal and private, that many seniors receive either do not increase at all or only grow by tiny amounts that do not keep up with inflation. Most seniors find their income eroded but cannot return to the workforce to improve their economic situation. Not having to pay MSP premiums would certainly help older adults to cope with increases in their cost of living.

When seniors retire they do not expect that after years in the workforce, to see their income fall over time to the poverty level.

Introduction

The SmartWood Program of the Rainforest Alliance is conducting a group forest management assessment of Taan Forest Limited Partnership (Taan Forest) and British Columbia Timber Sales Chinook Business Area (BCTS). The assessment will be conducted from August 23rd to 26th, 2011 in the Village of Queen Charlotte, BC.

Scope of the Certification Assessment

Taan Forest is seeking FSC Forest Management Certification for group members including Taan Forest and BCTS for their operations within TFL 60 and the Haida Gwaii Timber Supply Area. The forest management certification assessment will assess the environmental, silvicultural, Aboriginal and socioeconomic aspects of the members of the group in order to identify non-conformances between the current practices of the group members and the FSC Standard. The FSC-BC Regional Standard will be used and is available on the FSC Canada website at: <http://www.fsccanada.org/BritishColumbia.htm>. SmartWood is accredited by the Forest Stewardship Council and this assessment process will follow procedures which have been approved by the FSC.

Assessment Team Composition

Krista West – Team Leader and Social Assessor – Krista has a B.Sc. in Forestry and a MPA with a specialty in Dispute Resolution. In her work as an environmental consultant she worked on sustainable forestry management and First Nations consultation in both BC and the Yukon. In addition to her operational forestry experience, she has a background working on treaty negotiations and the softwood lumber dispute with the BC Provincial Government. She is a SmartWood trained FSC Forest Management lead auditor and has worked on and observed several audits across Canada. She has managed the Western Canada and Maritimes SmartWood portfolio of clients since early 2009. Krista was on the pre-assessment team for this forest in early 2011.

Glen Dunsworth – Ecologist – Glen has over 25 years experience in forest renewal, biodiversity and forest genetics research in coastal British Columbia and Alberta. Glen has 15 years experience in forest

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renewal and genetics and for the last 8 years has worked almost exclusively in landscape ecology and conservation biology. During 1999 to 2004 he led the Ecology Team for the Forest Project – MacMillan Bloedel's and Weyerhaeuser's phasing-in of variable retention and stewardship zoning. He was responsible for the development and implementation of the Adaptive Management and Monitoring Program in support of the forest project. Glen has worked on ten FSC audit teams in BC and Alberta. He is currently a forest ecology consultant and has recently co-authored a book with Dr. F. Bunnell on forest biodiversity conservation and adaptive management through UBC Press. Glen was on the pre-assessment team for this forest in early 2011.

John Cathro has 20 years experience in the forest sector with industry, government, communities and First Nations. John has worked within the FSC framework for over 10 years developing standards, assisting companies get certified and conducting forest management and chain of custody assessments and audits. John has completed SmartWood training for both Forest Management and Chain of Custody auditors and has completed over 100 audits across western Canada.

Assessment Steps and Schedule

Following is a short description of the assessment process and a tentative agenda:

- ♦ Assessment organization – The SmartWood team will receive and review written information pertaining to Taan Forest Ltd. and BCTS prior to the on-site visit.
- ♦ On-site visit – The assessment team will be on Haida Gwaii from August 23rd to 26th and will review documents and interview Taan Forest and BCTS staff and interested parties.
