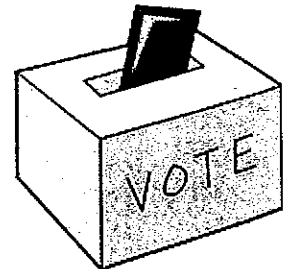

TSUNAMI

On the back cover you will see that we are getting ready for the GREAT SHAKEOUT! Remember that you need to have enough supplies to live for 72 hours. If you want information on making you and your family prepared for 72 hours, come by the office and we will be pleased to provide you with the information.

We want to take this time to familiarize you with the tsunami notification procedure: **Tsunami Warning** is issued when a potential tsunami with significant widespread inundation is imminent or expected. Warnings alert the public that widespread, dangerous coastal flooding accompanied by pow-

erful currents is possible and may continue for several hours after arrival of the initial wave.

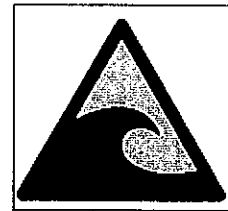
Tsunami Advisory is issued due to the threat of a potential tsunami which may produce strong currents or waves dangerous to those in or near the water. Coastal regions historically prone to damage due to strong currents induced by tsunamis are at the greatest risk

Tsunami Watch is issued to alert emergency management officials and the public of an event which may later impact the watch area. The watch area may be upgraded to a warning or

advisory - or cancelled - based on updated information and analysis.

Should there be a need to evacuate the low lying section of town, we will call residences in the immediate vicinity of harm; both sides of Bayview Drive, Industrial Road, Kumdis Road, Jasper Street, Water drive and any other residences in the immediate danger zone area. (This is why the next article is so important!)

Please gather at the school gym and await instruction.



EMERGENCY CONTACT #'s

The Village office maintains a list of phone numbers for every property so that when we experience issues with water, sewer, Tsunami or anything else we do, we can quickly call and communicate the issue.

Recently we have found that we don't have contact information for some residents in the community or the message is left unheard. Please make sure that we know you are here,

we promise we will not sell or give out your information and it will only be used for situations regarding the services we provide to you.

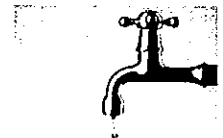
In addition, when you are away, please make sure that you have someone tending to your property. It is very unfortunate when situations arise and we have no way of contacting property owners to notify of potential danger

USE WATER WISELY

Reduce, Repair, Retrofit

By following the three golden rules for the wise use of water, you can cut your water use nearly in half.

REDUCE: By making small changes to water use habits and by installing water saving devices, you can significantly reduce the amount of water you use.

REPAIR: Regularly check toilets, pipes and faucets for leaks and repair immediately. One small leak can waste thousands of litres of water per year. This also means ensuring that all taps are turned off and not running when not in use.

RETROFIT: Retrofit means adapting or replacing an older, less water efficient fixture or appliance with one of the many water saving devices now on the market.

“IMAGINE” grants available to support health and well-being initiatives

Northern Health is looking for community partners to help improve the health and wellbeing of those living, working, learning and playing in Northern B.C.

NH's Healthy Eating, Active Living (HEAL), HEAL for Your HEART, Injury Prevention, and RoadHealth along with Men's Health, Tobacco Reduction and Preventive Public Health HIV Prevention are offering over \$380,000 worth of “IMAGINE” grants that will provide financial support for the work of community organizations to promote safe, healthy families and healthy communities.

The grants support the province's Healthy Families BC initiative, which aims to reduce chronic diseases such as diabetes, heart disease, stroke and cancer. Healthy Families BC supports healthy eating, healthy lifestyles, healthy families and communities and giving the most vulnerable BC children a healthy start in life.

Seven types of grants are available:

- **NEW - True North Strong & Tobacco Free:** Supporting activities and initiatives to reduce tobacco use in northern BC. These grants (up to \$1000 each) will fund tobacco reduction initiatives aimed at preventing people from starting tobacco use, protecting people from secondhand smoke exposure, helping people quit tobacco use, or helping to enforce provincial and federal legislations. Funding is also available for projects focusing on promoting Men's Health within industry (i.e. forestry, mining, construction, oil & gas, trucking).
- **NEW - HIV Prevention:** Funded in partnership with the Government of British Columbia to support projects aimed at reducing rates of HIV infection and its associated health complications. These grants (up to \$5000 each) will fund projects that promote youth and elder collaboration, engage youth, help communities develop HIV prevention plans, and/or promote increased HIV testing and education in Northern BC communities.
- **Injury Prevention:** Supporting activities and initiatives promoting safety and the prevention of injuries. These grants (up to \$2000 each) will focus on initiatives that prevent falls among seniors in the community, or prevent injuries among children and youth (0-19). Also **new this year**, grants of up to \$2000 promoting Men's Health and prevention of off-road injuries (e.g. ATVs and snowmobiling)
- **HEAL:** Supporting groups and communities within Northern Health that are looking to take charge of Healthy Eating and Active Living and encourage sustainable change in their communities. The HEAL grants (up to \$2000 each) will fund prevention-based strategies

aimed at reducing risks associated with diabetes, cardiac and vascular diseases, obesity and cancer through programs encouraging healthy foods, gardening, cooking, active living and healthy lifestyles all year round.

- o **HEAL for Your HEART** : Aimed at communities within Northern Health to provide education and skill building to prevent cardiac and vascular diseases and/or secondary health problems for people already diagnosed with cardiac and vascular conditions. These grants (up to \$2000 each) will be awarded to applicants that demonstrate how education, activity and healthy nutrition choices can work together to prevent childhood obesity and/or promote blood pressure awareness. Also new this year, grants of up to \$2000 targeted to men's health and wellness.
- o **RoadHealth**: Available to community-based groups for road safety prevention projects that target drivers, cyclists, pedestrians, school children or workers. These grants (up to \$5000 each) will support projects/initiatives aimed at reducing motor vehicle crashes and increasing the overall health of people who spend a lot of time driving, through education, awareness and the support of behavioral changes. These initiatives may include a focus on healthy eating, activity/alertness breaks, support of proper sleeping habits, promotion of screening for health risks common to drivers, defensive driving education, etc.

Northern Health's goal in partnering with community groups to promote good health and safety is to help find fresh approaches to creating healthier northern communities and to acknowledge that communities are the most effective settings for promoting the health and wellbeing of northern residents.



Dear Members, Suppliers, and Friends:

Municipal elections are rolling around in November and the global economy is a warning sign of one issue that needs to be front and centre when the candidates come calling for votes in B.C.'s 160 municipalities – spending.

Spending by municipal politicians is starting to rival health care costs in its ability to increase every year. In fact, in B.C. they're going up at twice the rate of inflation and growth combined. Tax increases, development charges, and approval processes that can take up to 270 days, municipalities are needlessly driving up construction costs.

One of the biggest cost drivers for our cities and towns is wages and benefits. On average a municipal worker in B.C. gets 35 per cent more than their private sector counterpart doing the same job – plus they have iron clad job security.

There are solutions – two of which are profiled in this edition of *The Construction Monitor*. But British Columbia's taxpayers will only get to similar solutions if they put pressure on the candidates for office this fall to stem the tide of rising costs.

Structure of the Haida Gwaii LMPP

The proposed structure is for Skidegate Band Council to lead the application process while creating an industry and community led steering committee to lead the program. The program will include community representation from all Haida Gwaii Communities. As well, educational institutions will be represented as will industry sectors such as tourism, mining, forestry, energy, transportation and sport fishing. Ex-officio members will also be invited to participate including Parks Canada, the Rural BC Secretariat, Ministry of Social Development and the Aboriginal Tourism Association of BC.

The Haida Gwaii LMP is a local project. It also has the potential to be leveraged into other similar communities, especially aboriginal communities with a strong tourism and natural resource potential.

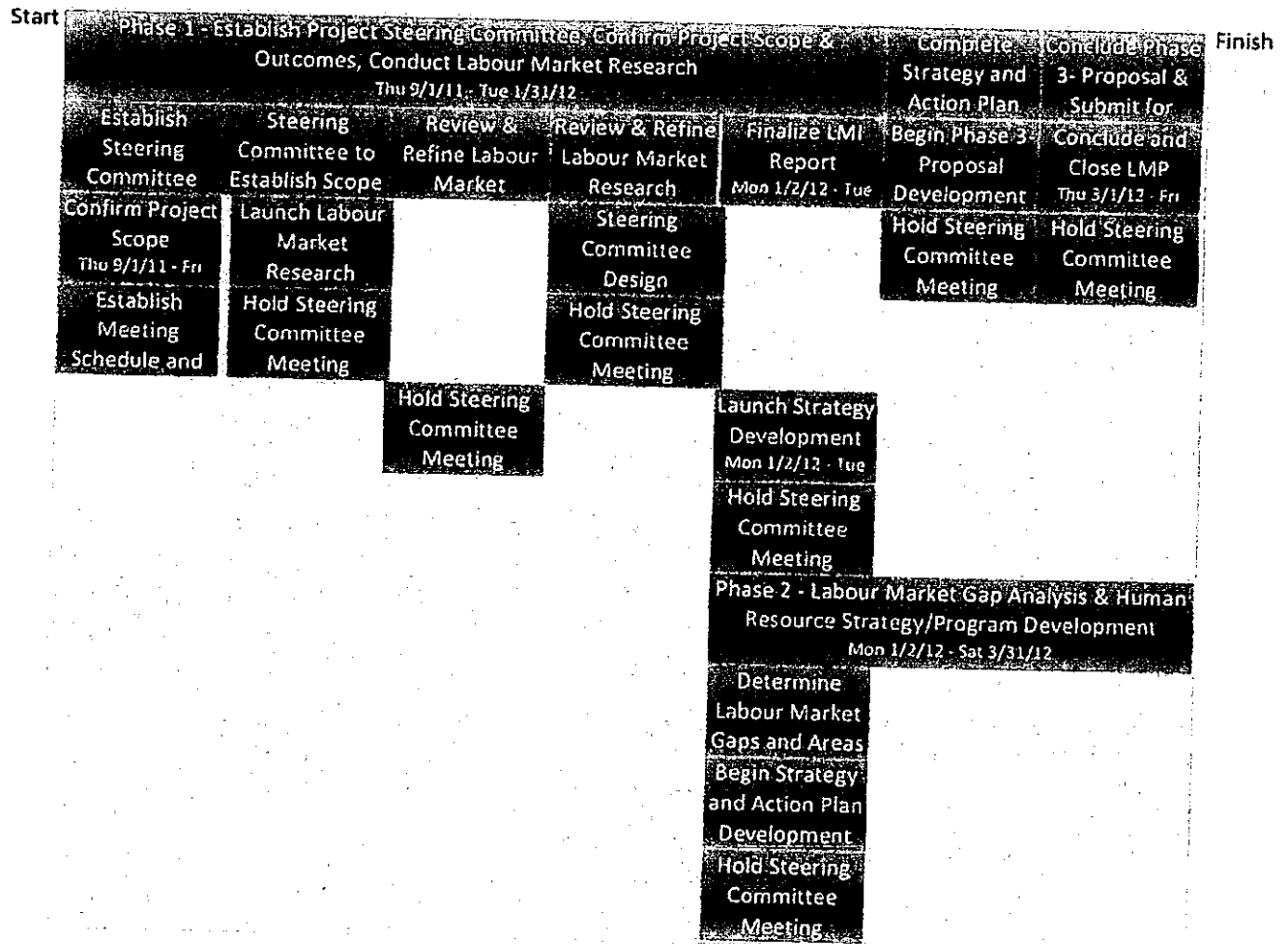
The Phase III Labour Development Mentorship Pilot supports the development and self-sustainment of aboriginal communities throughout BC has provincial application. The Mentorship program will, through a structured framework, identify comparable small rural aboriginal communities in BC who have demonstrated success in creating a strong and adaptable local labour force and pairing them with aboriginal communities in transition. While the mentorship program would be piloted to support the Haida Gwaii, once developed it can be broadened to support and acknowledge aboriginal success in labour market issues throughout BC.

Haida Gwaii Project Objectives

1. Enabling transition from declining/transitoning industry (fishing and forestry) and short term employment (tourism, construction) to sustainable long term employment ;
2. Developing long term partnerships across the Haida Gwaii communities, businesses and educational institutions;
3. Identifying the labour and skill sets needed to support and increase economic development of the region and communities;
4. Creating a community wide profile of the labour market, demographics, work and development opportunities and skill sets and gaps;
5. Examining long term employment growth opportunities from emerging business such as the Haida Heritage or Kaay Centre, marine services and TAAN Forestry;
6. Developing a labour market program framework that can be leveraged by other rural and aboriginal communities across BC;
7. Developing a Human Resource Strategy for the region that includes partnerships and funding options for long term support to the communities in the Haida Gwaii;
8. Creating a labour development mentorship program for aboriginal communities throughout BC identifying communities that have created strong labour market impacts and partnering with communities that are beginning the process or have struggled to create success for individuals;

MIEDS Moves on FLTC

Haida Gwaii, BC - After months of discussions, due diligence and option evaluations; MIEDS, on behalf of the communities, is moving forward on the Forestry License to Cut (FLTC).

In July 2010, the Ministry of Forests and Range offered MIEDS access to an interim volume of 25,000 m³ per year in a non-replaceable FLTC until the Community Forest Agreement for 80,000 m³ per year can be signed and the community corporation can be established.

“With a cumulative volume of 50,000 m³ MIEDS is interested in a process that is open and transparent; while providing islanders with local employment, maximizing financial returns and ensuring that no risk is born to the municipalities or the regional district” said Heather Hornoi, Economic Development Officer with MIEDS.

The business model is simple: MIEDS has a volume to log, MIEDS will offer access to the lumber for a guaranteed price per cubic meter and the winning bidder will take on the ongoing liability such as roads and tree planting.

The volume will be offered through a competitive bid process. “The Board of Directors has emphasised the guiding principles of this project: the importance of environmental stewardship and financial viability while minimizing exports and creating local jobs It is my job to ensure that we structure the RFP in such a way that these priorities steer the evaluation and award process”, stated Hornoi.

To ensure that the interests of the island municipalities and the regional district areas E and D are protected, MIEDS has entered into an agreement with B.A. Blackwell and Associates to oversee the project management. “I chose to go off island for this service as I wanted to ensure that there was no actual or perceived conflict of interest in developing this offer”, stated Hornoi.

MIEDS is working to get the RFP developed and advertised as quickly as possible; however, there is still a substantial amount of detail work and due diligence to be done. “Recent changes in legislation could add an additional delay to the offering and/or challenge how the offering is presented”, stated Hornoi. “However, MIEDS, our consultants and the Ministry are collaborating to address these obstacles expeditiously”.

So where do all the profits go? The Board of Directors has agreed that net profits will be held in a FLTC Reserve Fund. “Further discussions amongst Council’s will need to take place to determine the parameters around which these funds will be expended”, stated Hornoi.

Hornoi emphasised the importance of openness and transparency in this project, as well as in all MIEDS business. “I want islanders to feel comfortable that the organization is operating efficiently and effectively with their interests as a priority. I encourage anyone with an issue, concern, question or idea to come in and talk with me, my door is always open and my phone is always on”.
