Northern Health prepares for seasonal influenza clinics

Influenza season is nearly upon us, and Northern Health is urging those who are eligible for an influenza vaccine to ensure they attend a local clinic over the next few weeks.

Beginning the week of October 11 in many communities and throughout October in other communities, the seasonal influenza vaccine will be offered to those most at risk for complications from seasonal flu, including:

- People aged 65 years and older
- · Residents of long-term care homes
- · Adults and children with a chronic illness
- Healthy children aged 6 to 23 months
- People aged 6 months 18 years who have a condition that is treated for long periods with acetylsalicylic acid
- Household and regular child care contacts of children aged 0 to 23 months
- Household contacts of someone who is at high risk, whether or not those people have been immunized
- Pregnant women who will be in their third trimester during influenza season (typically spanning November to April)
- Aboriginal peoples (on and off reserve) for the 2011-2012 influenza season
- *for a full list of eligibility for free flu shots, visit the Northern Health website at www.northernhealth.ca.

A pneumococcal vaccine will also be available at the same time for seniors and those with chronic medical conditions; this vaccine helps to protect against pneumonia, which is the most common complication of influenza.

Influenza is a highly contagious respiratory disease caused by a virus. Symptoms can include fever, muscle aches, sore throat and a cough. Individuals with flu-like symptoms are urged to stay home until their symptoms go away.

"We recommend that people who are eligible for the vaccine make sure they visit a clinic," says Dr. Ronald Chapman, Chief Medical Health Officer. "The eligibility list is quite extensive, so we encourage people to look carefully at the list as they might be surprised to find that they qualify."

Between the start of clinics in October 2010, and the end of February 2011, nearly 27,000 Northern BC residents received a free flu shot at public health clinics across the region.

Clinic dates and times are being advertised in local communities and can be found, along with other influenza related information, by visiting www.northernhealth.ca. Many pharmacies and physicians also provide the free vaccine to eligible people. People not eligible for the free vaccine should contact their physician or local pharmacy.

Careful hand washing is one of the best ways to prevent the spread of illness, including influenza. People should wash their hands well for at least 20 seconds with warm water and soap - before and after using the washroom and before eating or preparing food.

For more information on influenza and other health issues, residents can also call HealthLink BC at 8-1-1, where registered nurses can provide confidential health information and advice, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

VANDERHOOF MILL USING NEW GREEN TECHNOLOGY

L&M Lumber in Vanderhoof recently began using a new technology to generator power with a waste heat recovery project. "What this project will do, is it takes waste heat, heat that is already going up the smoke stack and turns that into electricity to help off set the loads that a plant has. Why this is significant is that it is the first of its kind in British Columbia." Nechako Lakes MLA John Rustad stated. "It doesn't produce a tremendous amount of power but can help off set the electrical needs of a mill." He thinks this could be the start of a new green trend for sawmills across the Province.



PRINCE RUPERT AIRPORT IMPROVEMENTS

Minister of State for Transport Steven Fletcher and Minister of Canadian Heritage and Official Languages and Regional Minister for British Columbia James Moore were joined by Mayor Jack Mussallem and Vice-President of the Prince Rupert Airport Authority Shane Deinstadt to announce \$762,800 from the Airport Capital Assistance Program for YPR. \$616,300 will be used to repair pavement joints on

the runway while the remaining \$146,500 will be used to purchase a wet/drychemical spreader to de-ice planes and help de-ice or prevent ice formation on the runway.



"These investments will increase safety and will improve the operation of the airport going forward,," said Minister Fletcher.



"Today's announcement is good news not only for the people of Prince Rupert, but for people across BC and across Canada...We want to help the airport reach its full potential as an economic driver and a transportation hub on the West Coast."

During the presentation Minister Moore noted Prince Rupert's importance to the country's Asia-Pacific Gateway Strategy, and

Mayor Mussallem said that the City's link to Asia makes the announcement that much more important.

Northwest BC communities have joined together to market the region to investors on a world-wide scale.

Economic development agencies from the region have launched the new interactive website with detailed information on more than \$15 billion of planned projects and investment opportunities.

The Northern Development Initiative Trust has partnered with Northwest communities on the site, which provides detailed information on the Asia Pacific Gateway and the Northern Corridor.

GRANISLE - LAKEVIEW PARK UPGRADED

A \$400,000 grant from the Towns for Tomorrow fund will aid in major upgrades to the Lakeview Park in Granisle. The project built on reclaimed industrial land will include accessible pathways, solar powered lighting and a gazebo built from pine beetle killed wood.

The park will be located in the area between the Information Centre and the fire hall overlooking Babine Lake.

UNBC WINS CLEAN ENERGY BC AWARD

The Clean Energy Association of British Columbia presented the University of Northern British Columbia (UNBC) with an **Environmental Stewardship Award** for its innovative Bioenergy Plant.

Working with BC-based Nexterra and local companies, UNBC implemented the Bioenergy system that is one of the cleanest in North America. It will offset fossil fuel consumption on the Prince George campus by 85%. The project will serve as a platform for applied research and education.

Vancouver, B.C. — B.C. Citizens for Green Energy (BCCGE) is once again calling on the provincial government to stay the course with the policy of electricity self-sufficiency enshrined in B.C.'s Clean Energy Act.

BCCGE's call comes in response to the recent unveiling of the B.C. Jobs Plan by Premier Christy Clark; a plan that will significantly increase electricity loads in the province from new industrial activity over the next decade.

BCCGE co-spokesperson David Field says, given recent talk of watering down B.C.'s electricity self-sufficiency objectives, there is also talk that increased electricity demand from industrial activities like mining might be met with gas-fired generation and increased GHG emissions rather than with electricity from clean, renewable energy from hydro or wind energy.

"Mines consume a lot of energy, and the Jobs Plan calls for eight new mines by 2015, and expansion of at least nine existing mines; so we have to ask where the electricity is going to come from to power these mines," Field said. "We need to do it right; we need to serve the load growth from new industrial activity the right way with clean energy from renewable sources."

Field acknowledges that gas-fired electricity generation has a role to play in meeting peak electricity demand and for helping to firm renewable energy sources. But gas-fired generation can't take the whole load. What's needed, he says, is investment in new transmission capacity to get renewable energy from where it is generated to the new industrial load centers that will be created by the Jobs Plan.

"There's certainly going to be heightened job activity in the Northeast and Northwest of B.C. under the Jobs Plan, but developing B.C.'s renewable clean energy resources would create jobs all over the province. That would help all B.C. communities and particularly First Nations communities," Field said.

"We need to support what we've already started in this province with job-creating renewable energy development; now is not the time to abandon the goal of electricity self-sufficiency and the jobs that renewable energy development can create and support."

Field says, if B.C. wants to be a "climate change leader" as the Jobs Plan states, then we need to stay the course with renewable energy development and self-sufficiency and not miss the opportunity we have to meet future electricity load growth in our province the right way with renewable clean energy — today's renewable energy is tomorrow's cheap electricity.

"I applaud the vision of the BC Jobs Plan and taking the strengths of British Columbia, converting them into competitive advantages, and turning opportunity into lasting economic benefit for all British Columbians," Field said. "To me that means developing the wealth of renewable energy resources we have here in B.C. and not missing the opportunity to do it right by creating jobs throughout B.C. and a legacy of lasting economic benefit from renewable clean energy for future generations."

A poll conducted by Oraclepoll Research Limited between September 26th to September 27th 2011 found that a "strong 84% of respondents" were of the opinion that the BC government and BC Hydro should continue the current policy of generating enough electricity within the province to meet the requirements of British Columbians.

Dear Mayor Cory Delves & Council and CAO Heather Nelson-Smith:

Every home and business in B.C. relies on electricity; however, we face the challenge of an aging electricity system that has changed very little over the past 50 years. Exchanging old meters to new smart meters will create the foundation for modernizing B.C.'s electricity system. And, it will help us all enjoy safe, reliable, and more affordable power for decades to come.

Beginning in July 2011 through December 2012, BC Hydro or Corix, our B.C.-based contractor, will commence exchanging more than 1.8 million meters. Smart meter exchanges in your community will commence in October 2011 and are scheduled to be completed by November 2011*

As mentioned in our previous email, BC Hydro customers in your community will receive a letter a few weeks prior to their meter upgrade. The letter will notify customers when their meters will be exchanged and what they can expect during the process:

- In most cases the meter exchange will take less than 10 minutes to complete.
- Customers do not need to be home so long as there is safe, clear access to their meters.
- Most customers will experience a short power interruption, lasting no longer than 60 seconds.
- Installers will be identified with BC Hydro and Corix logos on their trucks and uniforms, and will have photo identification badges.
- Installers will leave written notification onsite for customers once the work has been completed.

With smart meters on the UBCM agenda, I asked BC Hydro for some background research, and thought you might be interested in the points below that compare smart meter radio frequency exposure to your time at UBCM and everyday life in communities. Some of these points may help you when the issue arises with your councilors, directors, and constituents.

It does help me put it in perspective. I am really looking forward to a more intelligent provincial electricity grid with the lights coming on more quickly at our lake cabin when a windstorm and fallen trees take the power out.

Have a great week at UBCM. Northern Development staff will have a booth at the Trade Show and we look forward to visiting with you and helping you with any funding projects that are of interest for your community or regional district.

- How many of us travelled to Vancouver by plane or by ferry? If you've been in an airport or on BC
 Ferries, you would have been in the midst of traffic control whose radio frequency far outweighs the signal of a smart meter.
- Radio frequency from smart meters is much lower than many common everyday items that we
 would all likely consider safe. How many of us sleep with our BlackBerry, iPhone, SmartPhone beside
 our bed? Is there an AM/FM radio or a cordless phone on your night table?
- Have you ever talked on your mobile phone for more than 30 minutes? If so, you've been exposed
 to more radio frequency than a smart meter over its 20-year life span.
- Do you have WiFi access in your hotel? Did you know that exposure to 4 minutes of WiFi is the equivalent of 1 year of a smart meter?
- Assuming you arrived in Vancouver on Tuesday and leave on Friday, your exposure to wireless in
 hotels and the convention centre would be about 4,590 minutes. That means UBCM delegates have
 been exposed to more radio frequency than smart meters would transmit over 1,147 years and
 that's assuming you are standing next to your smart meter the entire time.
- When delegates arrived at UBCM, one of the first resolutions we voted on was a motion to adopt electronic voting. How many communities here supported electronic voting using a handheld wireless device?
- How many communities have wireless internet available at City Hall? Colwood, Nanaimo, Sechelt
 and the Township of Langley to name a few...and these are just a few of those communities calling
 for a moratorium on smart meters.
- And yet, more and more communities are offering free Wi-Fi internet:
 - The City of Victoria has started an open free city-wide wifi network in partnership with local businesses using wireless mesh technology no different from smart meter networks. Victoria is also calling for a moratorium on smart meters.
 - A super Wi-Fi network is currently under construction in Vancouver and will blanket the Lower Mainland with Wi-Fi coverage. People will have internet access on transit, in parks, on the street and everywhere else.
 - In and around Nanaimo, free WiFi is available at Beban Park, Bowen Park, Nanaimo Ice Centre, Nanaimo Aquatic Centre, Oliver Woods Community Centre, Nanaimo-Collishaw Airport and Frank Crane Arena.
 - The City of Langford offers free Wi-Fi internet in the downtown core.
 - The City of Trail provides free high speed wireless internet service at the Trail Memorial Arena, Trail Aquatic and Leisure Centre, on Bay Avenue or at City Hall. Trail Public Library patrons are able to access wireless by connecting to Trail Hotspot.
- Public libraries are now offering wireless access, for example:
 - Vancouver Island Regional Library

- o Greater Victoria Public Library
- o The Prince George Public Library
- o Kamloops, Merritt and Chase branches of the Thompson-Nicola Regional District Library
- o Invermere Public Library
- o Creston & District Library
- o Nakusp Public Library
- o Nelson Public Library
- The District of Highlands fire department now has laptops that are equipped with wireless capability and are loaded with the proper software and installed in trucks to ensure the timely filing of reports with the proper authorities.
- The Cowichan Lake Outdoor Education and Conference Centre, owned and operated by the Town of Lake Cowichan, offers wireless internet throughout the Centre.
- Wireless parking meters have also been installed in Victoria and Vancouver. Smart meters and other
 wireless electrical and water meters are used by: Nelson Hydro, FortisBC, City of Penticton, City of
 Grand Forks, City of Richmond, City of Chilliwack and the Village of Queen Charlotte. In fact, by 2020
 about one billion smart meters will be installed worldwide.



From the Board Table

2012 Operating Budget Approved

Board members received the second draft of the 2012-2016 Financial Plan and approved a balanced operating budget of \$18,213,906 for 2012. Under the Library Act, public libraries are required to adopt a balanced budget for the following year prior to December 31.

This year, the provincial government provided \$1,265,213 – \$79,294 more than last year – which included grants for BC OneCard and Literacy Equity that were expected to be eliminated after 2010. The government announced that it will require comprehensive reporting for the grants to meet provincial priorities, develop local capacities and ensure accountability. This fiscal year, BC government's budget for the public library sector is \$13,990,000.

Municipal and rural levies will contribute \$16,486,603 to the budget, which includes increases to cover expenditures due to provincial minimum wage and pension rate adjustments, and expenditures for future new or expanded facilities.

In June of last year, the Board approved a 10-year plan to deal with the more than \$2.4 million in deferred maintenance issues of VIRL's 38 branch libraries identified in the *Consolidated Facilities Master Plan*. The plan called for a 1.25% annual increase for future new or expanded facilities, as well as a 1% increase for maintenance, fixtures, furniture and equipment.

The remainder of budgeted revenues come from overdue and other fees, and investment income.

Budget expenditures include \$2,228,283 for purchase of library materials, up 3% over last year.

Seven principles guided the development of the financial plan as follows:

- Strive to maintain excellence in the services and programs outlined in the strategic plan
- Provide core services more effectively and efficiently.
- Incorporate feedback obtained from stakeholders, partners and staff during last year's strategic planning process.
- Create welcoming environments that are pleasing and safe.
- Gain efficiencies through diligent resource stewardship, high performance and accountability on the part of all staff.
- Provide staff training and support that will attract and retain talented high quality staff.
- Act on Consolidated Facilities Master Plan recommendations and correct long standing budgetary issues with respect to maintenance and provision of useable space.

Update on Nanaimo North branch

The Board received an update on the proposed 15,422 sq. ft. Nanaimo North branch on Hammond Bay Road and agreed to accept the recommendation to maximize space in the building and move some staff to the Harbourfront branch.

Nanaimo North borrowing

The Board authorized a 30-year Indebtedness Agreement with the Regional District of Nanaimo, which has agreed to borrow \$8-million on VIRL's behalf from the Municipal Finance Authority (MFA) for construction/renovation of the proposed Nanaimo North branch.

Lake Cowichan borrowing

The Board received an update on the borrowing process to be facilitated by the Cowichan Valley Regional District (CVRD) on behalf of VIRL for construction of a new branch in Lake Cowichan.

LEED design to be incorporated in facilities plan

As part of its facilities plan, the Board has agreed to incorporate LEED 'green' design standards' rather than apply for formal LEED certification. Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) is a voluntary, internationally accepted benchmark that provides proof of design, construction and operation of high performance 'green' building. LEED certification is an expensive process, eg LEED certification for the proposed Lake Cowichan branch could add as much as \$18,000 to the estimated \$1-million project, while LEED certification for the Nanaimo North branch would likely cost an additional \$63,350.

New Library Managers introduced

Two new Library Managers were introduced to Board members – Jamie Anderson and Stephen R. Warren, of the Parksville and Courtenay branches, respectively. Jamie Anderson comes from the Thompson Nicola Regional District Library System, where he was Head of Reference. Prior to that position he served as the Systems and Web Librarian at Kwantlen University College, and librarian at Vancouver Public Library. Stephen R. Warren comes from the Lethbridge Public Library, where he provided reference and readers' advisory services. Prior to that Stephen worked as a temporary CSL at the Courtenay branch.
