The meeting was called to order at 7:40 pm and Wally Cheer motioned to adopt the amended agenda, seconded by Ian Gould. Wally Cheer motioned to accept the minutes of the March 12, 2009 meeting and this was seconded by Ian Gould.

BUSINESS ARISING:

Progress report by Wally Cheer was given to the Committee about trails and grant applications by the Village. There was a discussion about the best location of a tourist information centre, a separate site or expansion of the service supplied by the museum. The Committee agreed the museum would be the best info site and Wally Cheer will explore this with the Historical Society. The next discussion was over industrial use versus recreational use of the government dock. It was agreed the sooner Council announces a vision for the dock, the sooner the community could move toward making the dock a focal point in the Village. The next discussion was about maintenance and repair of the Golden Spruce trail. The trail is bad shape and requires repair. It was thought volunteer labour should be easy to obtain but finding crushed rock for the trail would be a problem. Committee members will explore ways of obtaining the rock.

Germain Vigneault updated the Committee on progress of the webpage. He told the Committee he needed to do more work with the website genre and the projected completion date would be sometime this fall. There was a discussion about the basic form the webpage would take.

Urs Thomas updated the Committee about Northword magazine advertisement. It was decided the ad would have a transparent backdrop of the government dock and the ad would contain three photos, one of Canada Day's festivities, one of old growth forest, and one of the museum. Two items would be prominent and they were the Sunset Park campground and Port Clements is the Gateway to the Wilderness. Urs Thomas told the Committee the magazine wants to do a story on the Golden Spruce trail and this makes repair of the trail more urgent.

NEW BUSINESS:

Chris Marrs told the Committee it is important to try and attract visiting boat owners to Port Clements instead of watching the boats being towed past town to Masset. These people have wealth to leave wherever they visit.

After discussion, the Committee decided:

- Approach treeplanters to see if they could plant a row of trees between Unsworth property and Village property
- Ask Council to create a policy for the boat launch facility which would restrict industrial
 use of the facility and prohibit blocking access to the boat launch.
- Include the virtues of Masset Inlet in advertising in an attempt to lure boat owners to our community. Also, a sign should indicate the entrance to the boat launch facility.
- Garbage bins need to be added the boat launch facility and to the entrance of the
 walkway to the small craft harbour. A discussion about type of garbage containers
 ensued. Discussion points were: dumpster bins invite household garbage; regular pickup
 of garbage from the containers is essential; bear-proof type bins would be the most

suitable because they have the smaller openings and cannot be accessed by dogs or raccoons.

The Gwaii Forest Society will be closing its office doors effective April 30, 2009. All spending on the fund—the \$24-million legacy from SMFRA—is frozen until the market rebounds in five or more years. However, that does not mean the Society will dissolve.

The Gwaii Forest Board of Directors has chosen to keep our Society status active to retain our good standing as "agent" of the forestry fund on behalf of the Gwaii Trust (Gwaii Forest Charitable Trust). It is hoped this will pave the way for the Islands two trust funds to continue to operate independently.

Furthermore, the Board recognizes the major investment by the Islands Community in creating a Society with an established legal structure, associated operational policy and an all-Islands board structure. There is also added value in preserving a Society dedicated to sustainable forest management and community stability that are key elements in the path to building a robust Islands economy.

This decision to keep our Society status active requires the full support of the Island communities. While the Society will not be actively operational we will need to hold an annual general meeting to meet our filing obligations under the BC Society Act. This will require each community to continue to appoint a director to the board every two years. That director will be asked to attend one meeting—the AGM—annually.

We therefore request a letter from your community supporting the continuation of the Gwaii Forest Society.

Re: Partnership to Create New Homes for Seniors and Persons with Disabilities

It is my pleasure to invite the Village of Port Clements to partner with the Province of British Columbia in the creation of new housing units for low-income seniors and persons with disabilities.

The Seniors' Rental Housing initiative is part of a new federal-provincial housing agreement announced by Premier Gordon Campbell today. Under the terms of the new agreement, funding of \$123.58 million will be provided to create up to 1,000 housing units over the next two years for seniors and persons with disabilities. The federal and provincial governments will each provide matching allocations of \$61.79 million. This new initiative will create approximately 800 jobs in B.C.

This initiative will focus on promoting partnerships with municipalities, non-profit housing providers and the private sector, and will in most cases use modular, manufactured housing construction that promotes wood product use. The use of manufactured housing will support local manufacturers and ensure that the homes can be provided in a timely manner. This housing initiative will be administered by BC Housing (a program overview and schematic design of typical modular units are attached).

This is an important opportunity for the Province and the Village of Port Clements to respond to local housing needs. The Province, through the affordable housing agreement, will provide capital funding for the construction of the modular homes. As housing sites for this initiative must be provincially or municipally-owned, the Village of Port Clements may wish to make a significant contribution by providing a suitable site for development. I have asked BC Housing to also identify potential properties held by its land holding company, the Provincial Rental Housing Corporation, for the purposes of this program. Once completed the development will be managed by a local non-profit sponsor through an agreement with BC Housing.

Introduction

The Seniors' Rental Housing initiative is part of a new federal-provincial housing agreement announced in April 2009. This agreement provides for \$123.58 million to create up to 1,000 housing units over the next two years for seniors and persons with disabilities. The federal and provincial governments will each provide matching contributions of \$61.79 million. This new initiative will create approximately 800 jobs in BC.

This initiative will focus on promoting partnerships with local governments, non-profit housing providers and the private sector, and will in most cases use modular, manufactured housing construction that promotes wood product use.

Program Overview

The Seniors Rental Housing initiative will:

- Increase the supply of new affordable rental housing for low-income seniors and persons with disabilities, primarily in small communities.
- Provide affordable rental housing through a delivery model that, where possible, requires no ongoing operating funding, subsidies or support services.
- Stimulate local economies through the development of new rental housing and the use of local materials.

The Seniors' Rental Housing initiative helps implement the provincial housing strategy, *Housing Matters BC*. The initiative is an important addition to the range of housing options for seniors, including SAFER, Seniors' Supportive Housing, and Independent Living BC.

How the Initiative Works

The Province will provide capital funding for the construction of the homes. As housing sites for this initiative are to be provincially or municipally-owned, local governments are being asked to consider offering municipally-owned sites for development. BC Housing is also identifying potential properties held by its land holding company, the Provincial Rental Housing Corporation, for the purposes of this initiative.

The coordination of the construction of all developments funded through this initiative will be lead by BC Housing in consultation with partners. The developments will be managed by a local non-profit housing provider. Non-profit operators will be responsible for the day-to-day operations, maintenance and management of the housing. Operating subsidies, if required, will be provided by BC Housing.

Target Population

This initiative will target low-income households who are:

- Seniors, defined as single persons age 55 and older or couples where at least one person is aged 55 or older.
- Persons with disabilities in receipt of a recognized disability pension, or considered disabled for income tax purposes. For couples, one person must meet these criteria.



Income limits for eligible individuals or households will be based on Core Need Income Thresholds established by Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation which vary by community. Generally speaking, eligibility requirements for subsidized housing in British Columbia will apply.

Use of Modular Housing

In order to respond quickly and take advantage of funding opportunities, single storey modular housing construction will be promoted, dependent on specific community needs, conditions, partnerships and resources. In certain situations multi-storey wood frame housing forms may be used where land value requires a higher density to achieve an economically viable project and community planning objectives.

All new buildings will be required to meet or exceed energy efficiency requirements, such as the energy performance standard of EnerGuide 80, the use of Energy Star rated products, and an overall reduction in Greenhouse Gas (GHG) Emissions as per the requirements of Bill 44, Greenhouse Gas Reduction Targets Act.

A sample modular unit design has been prepared for illustrative purposes, which provides independent living for seniors and for persons with disabilities and that will fit well in the communities. Unit sizes are modest, with one-bedroom units typically in the 600 sq. ft. range See sample unit design and renderings attached.

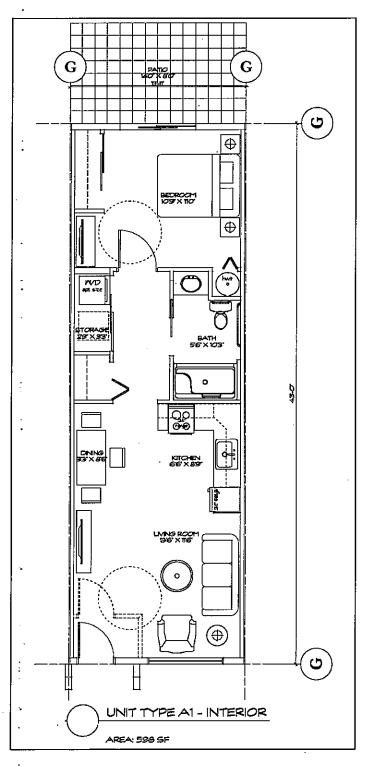
Selection of Sites and Housing Providers

BC Housing will work with local governments to review and identify an appropriate site for the development that is either municipally- or provincially-owned. The selection of housing sites for this initiative will take into account a number of factors including proximity to public transit and health services, and accessibility to shopping, amenities and community supports. Co-location with existing housing projects or other community amenity spaces is encouraged.

A Request for Expression of Interest (REOI) will be issued by BC Housing for housing sites where non-profit housing providers have yet to be identified.

VILLAGE OF PORT CLEMENTS

BYLAW NO. 372

A Bylaw of the Village of Port Clements to provide for the borrowing of money in anticipation of revenue.

The Council for the Village of Port Clements in open meeting assembled enacts as follows:

Whereas:

- A. The Village of Port Clements (the "Municipality") does not have sufficient money on hand to meet the current lawful expenditures of the Municipality;
- B. Section 177 of the Community Charter permits the Council, without any further approval, consent or assent to borrow money necessary to
 - (a) meet current lawful expenditures, and
 - (b) pay amounts required to meet the Municipality's taxing obligations in relation to another local government or other public body;
- C. The Municipality's outstanding debt for the purposes of Section 177, must not exceed the total of:
 - (a) the unpaid taxes for all purposes imposed during the current year (deemed to be 75% of all taxes imposed for all purposes in the preceding year), and
 - (b) the money remaining due from other governments.
- D. The unpaid taxes calculated as 75% of all taxes imposed for all purposes for the 2008 tax year are \$227,023 and the money remaining due from other governments is \$0 totaling \$227,023 the total representing the maximum amount that may be borrowed under this bylaw.

NOW THEREFORE, the Council for the Village of Port Clements in open meeting assembled, **ENACTS AS FOLLOWS**:

- 1. This Bylaw may be cited as "The Village of Port Clements Revenue Anticipation Borrowing Bylaw No. 372, 2009".
- 2. The Council is authorized to borrow upon the credit of the Municipality from the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce an amount or amounts not exceeding the sum of two hundred twenty seven thousand and twenty three dollars. (\$227,023), as may be required and to pay interest thereon at the prime rate of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce.
- 3. The form of obligation to be given as acknowledgment of the liability shall be a promissory note or notes, or an overdraft agreement bearing the corporate seal and signed by the Mayor and the Treasurer.

Borrowing By-Law For a Corporation

By-law Number: 372, 200

A by-law respecting the borrowing of money, the issuing of securities and the securing of liabilities by

the "Corporation"

Be it enacted as a by-law of the Corporation as follows:

The directors of the Corporation may from time to time:

- a) borrow money or otherwise obtain credit upon the credit of the Corporation in such amounts and upon such terms as may be considered advisable;
- issue, reissue, sell or pledge debt obligations of the Corporation, including without limitation, bonds, debentures, debenture stock, notes or other securities or obligations of the Corporation, whether secured or unsecured for such sums, upon such terms, covenants and conditions and at such prices as may be deemed expedient;
- c) charge, mortgage, hypothecate, pledge, assign, transfer or otherwise create a security interest in all or any currently owned or subsequently acquired real or personal, movable or immovable property of the Corporation, including among other things, book debts and unpaid calls, rights, powers, franchises and undertaking, to secure any money borrowed or any other debt or liability of the Corporation;
- d) guarantee to Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce ("CIBC") the indebtedness and liability of any person, firm or corporation, in either a limited or unlimited amount and either with or without security; and
- delegate to such one or more of the officers and directors of the Corporation as may be designated by the directors all or any of the powers conferred by the foregoing clauses of this by-law to such extent and in such manner as the directors shall determine at the time of each delegation.

1. PURPOSE OF ORGANIZATION

The Port Clements Historical Society operates a museum in Port Clements, BC. The Society is funded by operating grants from the Skeena Queen Charlotte Regional District and the Village of Port Clemens. The Port Clements Historical Society is incorporated under the Canada Corporations Act as a not-for-profit organization and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Revenue Recognition

The Port Clements Historical Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured:

Restricted investment income is recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.

Capital assets

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Contributed capital assets are recorded at fair value at the time of the contribution. Amortization is not provided. Artifact acquisitions are expensed when acquired and are not capitalized.
